Allie Fyfe - Nurse Specialist

I'm a Nurse Specialist responsible for co-ordinating the Gateway Clinic at Te Puaruruhau. Te Puaruruhau is the Child Protection team for Starship Hospital. Te Puaruruhau is a multi-agency service with Police, Oranga Tamariki and health all located in one building. Our Gateway clinic sees around 220 children per year and all assessments are completed by senior Paediatricians

Sally Kedge - Speech Language Therapist

Sally Kedge is a speech-language therapist, Court-appointed Communication Assistant and New Zealand Speech-language Therapists' Association's (NZSTA) Expert Advisor on vulnerable children/youth. She is one of the founders and the Director of Talking Trouble Aotearoa NZ: a social enterprise delivering professional training, research, speech-language therapy clinical practice and Communication Assistant roles for NZ Courts. Her clinical practice and research focuses on the speech, language and communication needs of children and youth who are involved with child protection, youth justice, mental health and behaviour services. She has been a Court-Appointed Communication Assistant (witnesses and those facing charges) in Youth, District and High Courts and at Family Group Conferences.



She coordinates a special interest group for speech-language therapists on vulnerable children/youth and sits on a working party chaired by Judge Fitzgerald which is developing processes and practices for Court-appointed Communication Assistants in NZ Youth Justice. She is interested in the relationships between oral language skills and emotional and behavioural development in children, in the role of oral language as a protective factor related to children's resilience, and in how professionals involved with vulnerable children/youth can integrate an oral language focus into whatever work they are doing with children and their families. She provides training on recognising and addressing the language and communication needs of children and teenagers for professionals who work with children/youth in contexts e.g. courts, care and protection and youth justice residences and community teams, schools, behavioural and mental health intervention services.

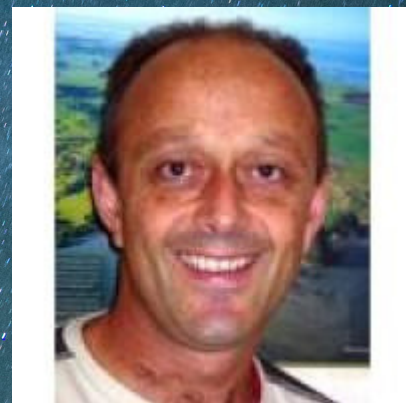
Title: Managing children and young people with neuro-developmental issues
